The 30th Anniversary Special! revisits the festival's history

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É Tudo Verdade/It's All True — International Documentary Film Festival announces the program for its 30th edition in a press conference led by founder and director Amir Labaki this Saturday, March 15, at IMS Paulista in São Paulo. The festival runs from April 3 to 13, screening simultaneously in five theaters in São Paulo and three in Rio de Janeiro.

The 2025 edition will showcase 85 productions from 30 countries, including feature-length, medium-length, and short films. The program also features conferences, debates, and online screenings. Admission is free.

The 30th edition of **É Tudo Verdade/It's All True – International Documentary Film Festival** is sponsored by Itaú, in partnership with Sesc-SP, and supported by Spcine, Galo da Manhã, and Itaú Cultural. The festival is presented by Brazil's Ministry of Culture through the Federal Cultural Incentive Law (Law No. 8313).

Brazilian documentaries that tell the stories of two iconic figures in national culture, Rita Lee and Marília Pêra, will have their world premieres at the opening screenings. *Ritas*, by Oswaldo Santana, will be shown to invited guests on April 2 at 8:30 PM at the Cinemateca Brasileira in São Paulo. The Rio de Janeiro opening will feature *Viva Marília*, by Zelito Viana, on April 3 at 8:30 PM at Estação Net Botafogo.

The awards ceremony will take place on Saturday, April 12, at 7:00 PM at the Cinemateca Brasileira in São Paulo. The productions awarded by the official juries will have special screenings in both cities on April 13.

With the prestigious recognition of **É Tudo Verdade/It's All True** as a "Qualifying Festival" by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, the four films winning the official jury awards for the Brazilian and International Competitions in Feature/Mid-Length Films and Short Films are automatically qualified for consideration for the 2026 Academy Awards® in both categories.

The fact that this festival reaches its 30th edition this year reaffirms, first and foremost, our initial belief: documentary film requires an annual platform in the country that would provide audiences with access to the excellence and originality of both Brazilian and international non-fiction production," says Amir Labaki.

The program of É Tudo Verdade/It's All True is structured into Competitive Showcases for Brazilian Feature/Medium-Length Films, International Feature/Medium-Length Films, Brazilian Short Films, and International Short Films, as well as Non-Competitive Sections: Special Programs, The State of Things, Latin American Focus, and É Tudo Verdade/It's All True Classics.

Committed since its inception to presenting and revisiting key figures in the development of documentary art, the festival honors the work of Vladimir Carvalho (1935-2024) in 2025, one of the most influential filmmakers in the history of **É Tudo Verdade/It's All True**, with the screening of the nine feature films he made over more than half a century. The international retrospective, in turn, highlights the work of British director Humphrey Jennings (1907-1950), regarded as the first poet of English non-fiction filmmaking. The cycle presents eight of his classics, such as *Fires Were Started* (1943) and *Family Portrait* (1950), along with a documentary about his work, directed by Kevin Macdonald (winner of the 1998 Oscar with *One Day in September*).

The celebration of É Tudo Verdade/It's All True's 30 uninterrupted years brings the 30th Anniversary Special!, featuring screenings and gatherings. Three landmark documentaries from the festival's history will be shown. *The Comrade: The Life of Luiz Carlos Prestes*, by Toni Venturi, and *Noel Field – The Fictitious Spy*, by Swiss director Werner Schweizer, were the first winners of the competitive sections at the festival's second edition in 1997. No awards were given at the inaugural event in 1996. The classic *Man Marked for Death* (1984) by Eduardo Coutinho will also have a special screening, inspiring the cover of the 30th edition's catalog.

As part of the 30th Anniversary Special!, the Centro de Pesquisa e Formação of Sesc-SP will host a seminar on April 10 and 11 with four Brazilian filmmakers who have won the competitive

section of **É Tudo Verdade/It's All True**: Eliza Capai, Joel Zito Araújo, Paulo Sacramento, and Roberto Berliner.

On April 8 and 9, the 22nd edition of the International Documentary Conference will take place, co-organized with the Cinemateca Brasileira in São Paulo, with its program to be announced later. Among other parallel activities, the Spcine Convida meetings are also highlighted.

In 2025, the screening circuit in São Paulo will include CineSesc, the Cinemateca Brasileira (Grande Otelo and Oscarito Theaters), the Instituto Moreira Salles/IMS Paulista, and the Centro Cultural São Paulo. In Rio de Janeiro, screenings will take place at Estação NET Botafogo, and Estação NET Rio.

To make the program more accessible to the public, the streaming program on Itaú Cultural Play will feature, from April 14 to 30, 6 short films from this year's Brazilian competition and 4 short films by honoree Vladimir Carvalho.

Dir. Celeste Rojas Mugica Chile, Argentina, France; 77 minutes; 2024 Language: Spanish Rating: 14+ Synopsis: He develops and imagines a world inside a darkroom; his daughter weaves a dialogue within it: about latent and invented images, about ways to resist and navigate through darkness.

Toroboro: The Citizen's Referendum

Manolo Sarmiento Ecuador, Brazil; 76 minutes; 2024 Language: Spanish Rating: 12+ Synopsis: In 2007, Ecuadorian President Rafael Correa proposed not exploiting the ITT block in Yasuní National Park in exchange for an international compensation of \$3.6 billion. However, the rise in oil prices led to the resumption of the project.

My Foreign Land

Dir. Lakapoy Collective, Louise Botkay, and João Moreira Salles Brazil; 99 minutes; 2025 Language: Portuguese, Tupo Mondé Rating: All Ages Synopsis: For many Brazilians, the 2022 elections represented a choice between democracy and authoritarianism. For the indigenous peoples of the Amazon, it was more than that. The forest, home to all of them, was under attack. The film follows a father and daughter during the forty days leading up to the election.

Playtime

Dir. Lucia Murat Brazil; 83 minutes; 2025 Language: Portuguese

Rating: 14+ Synopsis: Students talk about violence, racism, and femicide, sharing personal experiences. In schools in conflict areas, they create performances based on the local reality. In another school, they stage *Clara dos Anjos*, by Lima Barreto, linking the abuse suffered by the protagonist to their own contemporary experiences.

Dir. Marek Sulik Slovakia, Czech Republic; 108 minutes; 2024 Language: Slovak Rating: All ages Synopsis: An intimate portrait of a woman who sought to bring a human and open approach to the competitive and traditionally male-dominated world of high politics, while also fighting the most demanding battle of her life at home.

Misidentified

Dir. Fernanda Amim, Micael Hocherman

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Brazil; 110 minutes; 2025 Language: Portuguese Rating: 14+

Synopsis: Four Black men had their lives abruptly changed after being wrongfully incriminated based on a photograph. Thrust into a new reality, their stories reveal that behind legal conflicts, there are often innocent people.

Paid in Blood

Synopsis: After surviving a massacre in which the police killed 10 landless people on a farm in the Amazon region of Pará, Fernando, the main witness to the crime, and Vargas, his lawyer, fight for justice and for the right to land.

I'm Your Venus

Kimberly Reed USA; 85 minutes; 2024 Language: English Rating: 18+ Synopsis: Venus Xtravaganza emerged as a trans icon after being introduced as a glamorous "ball walker" in *Paris Is Burning* (1991), only to be murdered before the film's release. Decades later, her two families come together to uncover the truth behind the murder.

Petra Kelly - Act Now!

Dir. Doris Metz Germany; 104 minutes; 2024 Language: German and English Rating: 14+

Synopsis: Petra Kelly was one of the most influential political figures of the 20th century and a co-founder of Germany's Green Party. She fought for a world without weapons and nuclear energy, advocating for a peaceful society in harmony with nature. She was murdered at the age of 44.

About a Hero

Dir. Piotr Winiewicz Denmark, Germany, USA; 85 minutes; 2024 Language: English and Danish Rating: 14+ Synopsis: After a worker dies under mysterious circumstances, Werner Herzog travels to Getunkirchenburg to investigate the crime. The screenplay, generated by AI, incorporates "real" interviews reflecting on authenticity and immortality in the age of artificial intelligence.

Holding Liat
